# Joseph's Workbench

I would like to share a story I recently came upon. The author is "unknown," but he/she offers a valuable insight into dealing with the everyday life we've faced over the past 3 years.

While at a playground one day, a woman sat down next to a man on a bench. "That's my son over there," she said, pointing to a little boy in a red sweater who was sliding down the slide.

"He's a fine-looking boy," the man said. "That's my son on the swing in the blue sweater." Then looking at his watch, he called to his son, "What do you say we go, Todd?"

Todd pleaded, "Just five more minutes, Dad, please? Just five more minutes." The man nodded, and Todd continued to swing to his heart's content.

Minutes passed and the father stood and called again to his son, "Time to go now?" Again, Todd pleaded, "Five more minutes, Dad. Just five more minutes." The man smiled and said, "OK."

"My, you certainly are a patient father," the woman stated.

The man smiled and then said, "My older son, Tommy, was killed by a drunk driver last year while he was riding his bike near here. I never spent much time with Tommy, and now I'd give anything for just five more minutes with him. I've vowed not to make the same mistake with Todd. He thinks he has five more minutes to swing. The truth is, I get five more minutes to watch him play."

(My, you certainly are a patient father, the woman stated.) Truth be told – on my first reading of this story, I stopped at that line and began thinking: "Why doesn't Todd do what his father really wants?"

I and maybe some of you have become very impatient after all we've been through the past 3 years. We've stopped looking at the good side of life and of people. The dad in the story had an awakening in the tragic death of his older son, Tommy. He found light at the end of the tunnel.

For us, back in 2019, it began as the Coronavirus. But it turned into a pandemic of epic proportions affecting most all areas of our daily lives: the financial downturn and inflation/recession; the worries and fears of the future; our basic restlessness; the political chaos and campaign mudslinging; the curricular changes and experiences threatening the future education of our youth in terms of their beliefs and values; the short fuse impatience which has turned into crime, violence and shootings; the drug deaths as people seek an escape from reality; the being told what we can do and what we cannot do, especially as it constantly changed, and on and

When was the last time you smiled, had a laugh, enjoyed other people? How comfortable are you wishing someone a Merry Christmas or a Happy New Year? There as so many issues at stake. How do you know what to believe anymore: what to trust? Are the negatives wiping out the positive outlooks on life?

OK...Father Scrooge that's enough!

Some 2022 years ago, God the Father sent His Son Jesus to a dark, dark world to redeem us, to be our Savior. He came as the Light of the World – the Light we desperately needed to be able to have a chance for eternal life. So, while we live in a time of challenges, I recommend that we spend some special time at the manger – it's an antidote to our upside-down world. In His birth we are blessed with the PROMISE of HOPE, PEACE and LOVE. With Jesus we can find comfort through every difficulty life brings. Know that through it all, like the dad, each day is not another one to endure but a day to thank God – for the gift of life, and for the friends like you that He has put into our lives.

The dad in the story did not throw in the towel after the death of Tommy. We cannot through in the towel either. In this New Year of 2023, let's slowly and calmly look for the better way of dealing with the bumps of life.

My prayers are with you always, and especially in this Christmas season. I'm busier than ever, when it comes to the spiritual side of priesthood – the nursing homes are so rewarding to witness God reach out to these people, and brother priests are grateful when I can lend a hand.
