# Joseph's Workbench

It's good to be home! I always say that after any trip, whether I'm at a friend's in the Albany area or visiting friends in Kenya, East Africa, like I did the first two weeks of January. This joy at being home was no judgment against travel, I enjoy it. The trip to Kenya was wonderful!

Kenya is a large country, with about 55 million people, it sits on the equator and you might expect it to be steaming hot jungle. Kenya instead is much like the Western United States, much of it dry, flat, and hot, but not too hot. When I was there it was in the mid 70's most of the time, with the mornings in the mid 50's! However the sun is very strong, I needed my sunscreen, and you can get dehydrated as there is no humidity. The reason temperatures are so reasonable on the equator is that most of Kenya, except for the coast, is at high elevation, around 5000 feet, like Colorado.

Here are some impressions of Kenya, I'll give more complete thoughts in another column:

The landscape is beautiful, the people are friendly, there is much poverty but the amount of people working hard is amazing. There are numerous businesses, everything from small shops to giant supermarkets. When I was there it was their equivalent of summer vacation. There were many children out playing and I think the philosophy of my youth prevails in Kenya. My mother would throw us all out of the house and not expect to see us until dark!

Yet childhood is not all carefree, one thing I saw constantly was herds of farm animals, sheep, goats, cows, often herded by children! Traffic would often stop as a flock of sheep or other animals would cross the road. They graze on the shoulders of most main roads.


The other animal I saw constantly was donkeys! They pull carts, especially water carts which sell drinking water. Donkeys also carry loads of goods home for people. I was told horses are a rich person's animal in Kenya and I saw no mules.

I was overwhelmed by the hospitality of the people of Kenya. The two priests I was visiting, Fr. Fredrick Mwangi and Fr. Cleophas Tuka, put me up in their rectories. Fr. Fredrick and Fr. Cleophas both worked with me at St. Margaret's Church in Mattydale. I also hosted a number of Kenyan priests who were in the USA for the summer for mission appeals. All of them viewed my visit a chance to repay a debt of honor, returning the hospitality I gave them here in America.

Next time, I'll profile the wildlife I saw and then a Sunday Mass in Kenya!

# Oh What a Night...

As many of you have heard, our Confirmation II candidates had a very interesting and inspirational night this past weekend. They had the distinct pleasure of hearing from John Tumino, Director of "In My Father's Kitchen," an organization that continues to do unbelievable things for our homeless in the area. After the presentation, dinner, discussion and group activities in the parish center, our class headed over to the church for a teaching Mass with Fr. Hyde. Our candidates slept on the hard pews and floors in the church for the night to give them a small taste of what it would be like to not have the comforts we sometimes take for granted. They woke up early to have morning prayer with Father and out the door they went with a donut & juice in hand. In an email from a parishioner the next morning, they put it best: "Cindy, we can lecture, share and present to our young adults about our faith and how it plays out in our lives but to actually live it, is a whole different experience." As tired and uncomfortable as our candidates were from sleeping on the hard pews and floor, only dealing with some snoring and interesting noises, we reminded them that unlike the homeless:

- They were warm & safe in a building with water and bathrooms
- They had a blanket & pillow not an old rag as a cover
- They were fed and were surrounded by friends and adults who were watching out for them

Maybe now they can have just a little bit of understanding and faith in their hearts. As John shared with them; The homeless are not invisible and remember who is your neighbor?
