Dispensation from the obligation to abstain from meat on Friday, March 17, 2023 (The

Commemoration of Saint Patrick)

Most Reverend Bishop Douglas J. Lucia has granted dispensation to those Catholics within the territory of the Diocese of Syracuse from the obligation of abstaining from meat on Friday, March 17, 2023. As fitting and just, those who wish to abstain from meat are encouraged to do so. Those who choose not to abstain are asked to abstain from meat another day during the week of March 12 or to perform a charitable work or to engage in some other Lenten devotion.

Joseph's Workbench

There is a thought experiment that asks, "This is a red button, if you press it, you will get a million dollars! But, at the same time you press the button a random person will die, you will probably never know who it was who died." Would you press the button?

It is no surprise that some people say "yes, I would press the button!" One website ups the ante and says that ten people would die when you get one million dollars. That website records that 63% of respondents say they would press the button. Online comments range from, "I could save the lives of eleven people with the money, so it's OK!" to "People die every day, at least this does some good." It should be noted that the online poll is the least accurate way of measuring general opinion, I hope a real scientific poll would show more concern for the lives of random strangers.

Jonah Goldberg, the political columnist who brought this repulsive thought experiment to my attention, notes that things change when the choice becomes personal. Replace the button with a sniper rifle and tell the person that they won't get caught but must personally kill a random stranger and the offer of one million seems less attractive.

I'm sure many of your reactions to the above lines are, "Gross, Father Hyde, why bring this up?"

Well, this thought experiment got me thinking of the opposite, instead of a profit-making evil deed that resulted in death, what about a selfless good deed that results in life? The ultimate deed that does this is, of course, Jesus dying on the Cross and rising from the dead to save us from our sins. The more we are aware of all Jesus did for us, the more our gratitude will result in good deeds for others.

Yet what type of good deed? What is more satisfying, or more challenging? We recently had a collection for the earthquake victims in Turkey and Syria. You and I will never know who or how many people we helped by giving to that collection. Yet if we give to a beggar on the street we help someone up close and personal, which is better.

The answer, of course, is both are important. Personal giving to people we know, or at least encounter, is important. Jesus recommends it, "Whatsoever you did to the least of my brothers or sisters, you did for me. (*Matthew 25:40*)" It can be more challenging to help up close and personal, but we should all make the effort.

Giving to others impersonally, however, has helped change the world. Private donations and government foreign aid has helped end hunger and severe poverty around the world. Catholic Relief Services, the American Catholic foreign aid agency, is consistently rated as one of the best aid agencies, more of your dollars go to the cause of helping poor throughout the world. Catholic Charities, which helps the needy here in the USA is also highly rated. Both are worth your support.

Fortunately there is not an "evil button" that you can press to get a million dollars at the cost of an innocent life. There is, however, a "good button" on the websites of charities like Catholic Relief Services and Catholic Charities, it's called the "donate" button.

I hope we all see that challenging and up close giving and impersonal but important giving all respond to Jesus, who gave his life for all.
