EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

We recall the story of *Thomas*...who, not being present at Jesus' appearance, refused to believe in His Resurrection. Like Thomas, faith will always remain a challenge for us, but Jesus assures a blessing to those who, without seeing Him, shall trust in Him and believe in His words. Come into His Eucharistic Presence, and exclaim. "My Lord and My God!" to which Christ answers, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Monthly Adoration scheduled for Thursday, May 4, follows 9:00am Mass and ends with Benediction at 6pm.

Joseph's Workbench

What sacrament do you do most often? Like many priests (and lay Catholics) I would probably say the Mass, the Holy Eucharist. This weekend we'll have the joyful celebration of First Holy Communion for our children receiving Jesus for the first time. They've all already received my second most celebrated sacrament, Reconciliation (Confession). I go to confession regularly and hear confessions at least once a week.

Both of these sacraments are great, but I'd like to focus today on my "number three" sacrament, the Anointing of the Sick. I do this sacrament for people at home, often after Mass in church, usually when people are preparing for an upcoming medical procedure, and in the hospitals. I am an on-call chaplain for all the hospitals in Onondaga County and so am called in at various times to anoint when the regular chaplain is not available or for an emergency.

I want to give you an explanation of the Anointing of the Sick and encourage you to receive it. It is a sacrament of healing, both physical and spiritual. Don't hesitate to ask me for it, I and other priests often give the sacrament after Mass on weekends to those who need it. The sacrament is for all those with illness, acute or chronic, or, as I said above, upcoming surgeries or treatments. It is also for those who, because of age or chronic conditions, are in frail health.

What are the effects of the Anointing of the Sick? The Catechism of the Catholic Church mentions various effects:

- the uniting of the sick person to the passion of Christ, for his own good and that of the whole Church;
- the strengthening, peace, and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age;
- the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the sacrament of penance;
- the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of his soul;
- the preparation for passing over to eternal life.

One of the worst effects of illness is that it can cause us to think God no longer loves us. Nothing could be more wrong, we are very close to Jesus in our illness, who suffered on the Cross for our salvation. Illness, whether it is the nuisance of a cold or a life threatening illness like cancer, is something God wants to help us through with his love. Healing is not always physical, and most of it comes through God helping the doctors, although sometimes there are inexplicable cures. The spiritual strength from anointing, however, is its greatest gift.

In my priesthood I have seen the spiritual strength God gives through the sacraments of healing (Eucharist, Reconciliation, and Anointing of the Sick) give spiritual strength to the sick. Even if they are not healed of their disabilities or illnesses the spiritual strength of these sacraments gives the sick the strength to see God's love in their lives. This helps them have courage, helps them encourage their loved ones, and gives them hope of eternal life. Even if they die from their illness they have been given the healing strength of faith to see God saving them and bringing them to heaven.

Being united to Jesus Christ is the greatest grace of the Anointing of the Sick. When we are joined to Christ he gives us the grace to help in his work of saving the world. Offering up our sufferings due to illness joins us to his Cross and helps in the salvation of souls, including our own. If we only realized how close Jesus is to us when we are sick, we would have much more hope in the face of illness.

Let's all join together in praying for our sick. If you get the Anointing of the Sick use that time to unite in prayer with Christ, and with all the sick, if you are with someone being anointed pray for them and all those who are sick. When we unite ourselves to the sick, we are imitating Christ the healer. We become more the Body of Christ in the world. Pray for the sick and visit the ones you know.
